# FORTY YEARS IN THE MAKING.

Dear Friends and Neighbors,

The arts have always been a fragile kind of magic. For forty years, Northern Lakes Arts Association has proven how strong that magic can be. We've grown because people here believe in beauty and in each other, one show, one class, one act of generosity at a time.

When NLAA began in 1986, there was no theater and no steady funding, only conviction. Volunteers built sets in garages, stitched costumes at kitchen tables, and sold tickets in the cold. Out of that work, something lasting took root.

In 2024, our programming generated more than \$500,000 in local economic activity. For every dollar spent on a ticket, audiences spent six more in local businesses such as Insula, Grand Ely Lodge, and Dairy Queen. The arts lift people up and strengthen the community that sustains them.

Today, our programs reach 21,000 people each year on a budget nearing \$300,000. Every dollar is stretched to create lasting impact. The same spirit that built those first shows still drives us: neighbors showing up, keeping creativity alive in a world that doesn't always make room for it.

NLAA has grown into a living arts ecosystem. MainStage brings Broadway in the Boundary Waters, concerts, and Reflections Dance performances. The Northern Lakes Arts Academy offers year-round creative learning. Community Arts & Events fills daily life with murals, music, and storytelling. Together, they make the arts part of Ely's fabric.

Last year, 1,750 young people joined NLAA programs. Scholarships made sure every family could say yes. A student who once froze in auditions sang a solo after two weeks of camp. One parent told me, "Being part of theater again changed my life. It reminded me who I am, and it inspired my two boys to find their own place on stage."

The next forty years begin now. Our 2026 season celebrates hope, grit, and the power of story: Annie opens with optimism, Oklahoma! with courage, and Jesus Christ Superstar with reflection. Broadway in the Boundary Waters returns for ten weeks of free concerts, and Stars of the North expands with new apprenticeships and paid opportunities for young artists.

We are shaping the Northern Lakes Arts Academy into a year-round center for creative learning so that no one is ever turned away from the arts because of cost or circumstance.

The arts remind us who we are. They build empathy. They keep us connected when much around us pulls apart. Your attendance, advocacy, and generosity keep this work alive. Every gift, large or small, is an act of faith in what art makes possible.

This is not a curtain call. It is an overture. The next act begins now.


## *Jesus Christ Superstar*

July 17–26, 2026




# A YEAR BY THE NUMBERS

## What It Takes to Keep the Arts Alive in Ely

To the audience, it looks effortless. Lights rise. Music swells. A story unfolds. But behind every performance, concert, and class is a community working together to make creativity possible.

Each year, Northern Lakes Arts Association produces eight major shows, supports dozens of artists, and reaches thousands of people. From rehearsals to workshops to concerts in the park, it takes vision, teamwork, and time.

Our Executive Artistic Director contributes more than 4,000 hours of labor annually, valued at \$150,000. Volunteers add another 10,000 hours, valued at \$180,000. Together, that investment builds access, connection, and belonging through the arts.

# CREATIVE SPIRIT OF THE NORTH

## Rachael Pace and the Art of Connection

In Ely, the edge of the wilderness often feels like the center of the world. Beneath its pines and along its quiet shores, stories unfold through brushstrokes, carvings, and color.

For artist Rachael Pace, those stories live in the details: the curve of a heron's wing, the geometry of a bunchberry leaf, the rhythm of a changing season.

As the 2025 Creative Spirit of the North, Pace embodies what this award was created to honor: resilience, curiosity, and the power of connection.

Her path to this point has been anything but linear. She began as a photographer, capturing weddings and stories of love and community before turning toward something quieter and more personal. It was in the wilderness, while leading expeditions across the deserts of Big Bend and the forests of northern Arizona, that she found her way back to art.

"The wilderness taught me to push through weather, exhaustion, and doubt," she reflects. "Art has a similar rhythm. You trust the process. You keep going."

Those lessons are visible in every mark she makes. Her linocuts and

watercolors blend precision with chance, allowing the natural world to guide her hand. Each piece invites pause and attention. A print of migrating birds or a sketch of a single tree becomes both observation and meditation.

Pace's work also speaks to something larger: the way art builds belonging. Through teaching, collaboration, and community projects, she creates spaces where people can gather, make, and share. Her next endeavor, a community-printed quilt, will invite participation from across Ely.

"It's about connection between people and ideas," she says. "That's what art is for me."

The Creative Spirit of the North Award, presented annually by Northern Lakes Arts Association, recognizes artists whose practice sustains and strengthens the creative

life of this region. Recipients receive studio support, teaching opportunities, and a platform to showcase their work.

For Rachael Pace, the recognition feels both humbling and hopeful. Her art reminds us that creativity is not a product but a practice, a way of seeing, listening, and belonging.

Because here, art connects us. And that connection is its own kind of wilderness.











# Northern Lakes Arts Academy

## Where Creativity Takes Root

The Northern Lakes Arts Academy is the next chapter in NLAA's story, a year-round home for creative learning in Ely. Born from the same conviction that launched Broadway in the Boundary Waters, the Academy brings people together to learn, teach, and create side by side.

It began with summer camps where young actors found their voices and adults rediscovered their confidence. Those first workshops grew into something larger: a movement to make the arts part of daily life in Ely.

Today, the Academy welcomes everyone: children discovering performance, teens exploring design, and adults returning to creative practice through acting, voice, movement, dance classes, visual arts workshops, and more. Each class becomes a place to belong.

Scholarships and pay-what-you-can tuition keep participation open. Local businesses donate materials, and teachers volunteer because they believe in what it does for this town. Every rehearsal, brushstroke, and class carries the same spirit that built NLAA forty years ago, the belief that the arts belong here and that learning together keeps them alive.

# THE NEXT GENERATION

**Every summer, the lights rise on a new generation.**

Behind those lights are teachers, parents, artists, and neighbors who believe creativity changes lives. At Northern Lakes Arts Association, young people learn more than lines or choreography.

They learn courage, teamwork, and the art of being seen. For many, NLAA isn't just a stage. It's a place to belong. It's where confidence replaces hesitation and curiosity grows into craft. In a small town like Ely, that kind of support can change the course of a life.

From Greenstone Art Camps, Reflections Dance Company, and the Stars of the North Broadway Theater Camps, youth across northeastern Minnesota are learning to speak through color, song, and story. They're painting murals that brighten schools, performing shows that fill the Vermilion Fine Arts Theater, and discovering that art isn't something distant. It's home.

Apprentices work side by side with theater professionals throughout the summer season, earning a \$500 performance stipend and \$20 an hour for up to 25 hours of hands-on experience in acting, design, or technical production.

The Northern Lakes Apprenticeship Program bridges education and the professional arts world. It gives students real-world skills, mentorship, and the confidence to see art as both passion and profession.

A student who once froze in auditions sang a solo after two weeks of camp. Another chose to study theater in college after learning their craft here. Each story becomes a thread in something larger, a creative community growing its own future.

## A Light That Never Dimmed | Honoring Cecilia Rolando

Ely has always been a town that makes things with its hands: ore, wood, bread, music. In the rhythm of the Northwoods, art was never decoration; it was daily life. It was what people did after the mine whistle blew, what carried families through the dark winters, what turned neighbors into community.

That current of creativity runs through the story of the Northern Lakes Arts Association and through the life of Cecilia Rolando, its founding Executive Director. Her 40th anniversary reflection reminds us that the arts here were not imported or invented. They grew from the soil itself.

"This community has always been an arts community," she wrote. "It started when the immigrants moved here to be workers in the mines in the early 1900s. With them, they brought their music, dance, and theatre interests. The mines enabled the fine

school to be built and their children to have what is widely known as an exceptional education."

Ely was among the first Minnesota towns to have a school pool, a school band, and a junior college.

"Having great teachers in the public schools throughout the first years of the century, we had exceptional orchestras and bands. There were operas and plays presented. This was the foundation for a great acceptance of the arts in the community."

For Rolando and her generation, art was simply part of life.

"During my education locally, years of theatre productions, community choirs, City Band, dance programming, and instruction continued through Community Education, Ely Music and Drama Club, Ely Junior College, ISD 696, and the City of Ely connections, and we

took it for granted."

She saw how those early traditions shaped the town's identity.

"Some students educated here, with college elsewhere, then returned and contributed a lifetime to the arts," she wrote. "The schools brought in teachers who valued the arts and made Ely their home. They maintained lifelong involvement, as did others who came from elsewhere and have given so much to our lives with their talents, which they share profusely."

By the 1980s, as the mining economy faltered, so did that artistic foundation.

"In the eighties, when the town was in a downturn economically, a group of new area members and other locals, fearing a decline in the creative aspects of community, gathered with the idea of establishing a new arts

organization that would allow the arts to flourish. These were the founders of Northern Lakes Arts Association. That was 1985."

When Rolando was hired soon after through a local work incentive program, she had, as she described, "an empty desk and a phone. That was it." Grants came slowly, and volunteers often carried the weight of entire seasons. Yet she persisted. "The theater people became active with the musical Working. It brought in our first cash besides memberships. Still in a difficult financial position, after two years we were fortunate to have the newly established Donald G. Gardner Humanities Trust start releasing funds. At that time, we were the only organization applying. All this worked together, and we were off."

Momentum followed.

"Eventually, the membership was up to 350, and with a successful theatre program, NLAA provided 26 varied programs a year."

What began as a volunteer dream became a regional hub for the arts. "Because of our being an established contact in the community, we were the go-to welcoming entity when any arts group or performer wished to come to town," she recalled. "Performers arrived from across the region and from as far as Belarus, Argentina, and Finland. We had an arts committee for each discipline, and depending on those interested, we had locally created programming plus visiting performers, individual artists, and writers."

Through every season, Rolando's philosophy stayed constant.

"The emphasis on local creatives working together with others here be of foremost importance. My job was to facilitate these activities, serve as a liaison, pay the bills, do the advertising."

There were years when the future of NLAA balanced on faith alone.

"We never knew if the next grant would come," she said. "But someone always showed up with an idea, or a hammer, or a check."

By the time she retired in 2014, NLAA had become a cornerstone of community life.

"I am proud to have been a part of the early years of Northern Lakes. I cannot forget the significant individuals who generated ideas,

created local artistic programming, and provided me with their educated guidance."

She remembered volunteers who greeted audiences, helped with mailings, and carried programs at the door.

"These people built a footing for NLAA which has led to the organization today."

Rolando also wrote with gratitude for what came next.

"Eventually, I heard that Ian Lah was to be the new Executive Artistic Director. I was thrilled. I knew we were in good hands."

She recalled teaching art to Lah and his sister at her kitchen table years

earlier and expressed confidence in the organization's future.

"For the last several years now, watching growth in the community with young individuals moving here, the upgrading of local buildings for usable facilities, Northern Lakes adding other arts groups under its umbrella, and with Ian as Artistic Director, we are seeing magic."

Her reflection ends with both pride and warning.

"In times of upheaval like this, we must

be vigilant. We cannot be complacent and assume this shall always be. I'm talking to the choir here, I know, but do help out as much as you are able through participation, attendance, and donation."

Her words ring as true now as they did that night. They remind us that what began in Ely is larger than one town. It is a lesson for every rural place that has ever feared its own fading. The arts are not extras; they are essentials. They are how a community remembers who it is.

Forty years after that first meeting around a kitchen table, Northern Lakes Arts Association remains what she helped it become: a living ecosystem of creativity in the Northwoods. The light she tended still burns, steady and sure, passed from neighbor to neighbor, stage to stage, hand to hand.

Today, her legacy lives through every gift that keeps the light burning.


